 DEVICES AND IMPACT ON MATERNAL AND
 CHILD HEALTH OUTCOMES UNDER MED ICAID.

5 REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 18 (a) months after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-6 7 retary of Health and Human Services shall submit to Con-8 gress a report containing information on authorities and 9 State practices for covering remote physiological moni-10 toring devices, including limitations and barriers to such 11 coverage and the impact on maternal health outcomes, and 12 to the extent appropriate, recommendations on how to ad-13 dress such limitations or barriers related to coverage of remote physiologic devices under State Medicaid pro-14 grams, including, but not limited to, pulse oximeters, blood 15 16 pressure cuffs, scales, and blood glucose monitors, with the goal of improving maternal and child health outcomes 17 18 for pregnant and postpartum women enrolled in State 19 Medicaid programs.

(b) STATE RESOURCES.—Not later than 6 months
after the submission of the report required by subsection
(a), the Secretary shall update resources for State Medicaid programs, such as State Medicaid telehealth toolkits,
to be consistent with the recommendations provided in
such report.
